




Ten years later, James Astin made his first land purchase. When he died, in 1897, he owned over 7,000 acres and his farm was considered one of the richest in the state.


The EH Astin Farm, named for Ervin Hugh Astin, James' son, is what remains of this TEXAS LEGACY RANCH, and still one of the richest:

- Established and owned in same family since 1877
- 4 sources of income, being farming/cattle, water sales, oil/gas, and sand/gravel
 - o 2,156 acre income producing farm
 - o Two Pivot Irrigation Systems
 - o Five oil/gas pad sites with producing wells and another 6 Eagle Ford wells Pending
 - o 7 permitted water wells ranging from 800-1500 gpm
 - o Grandfathered pumping Water rights from the Brazos River
 - o Sand and Gravel from Brazos Bottomland could help Houston rebuild
- 2 Union Pacific Railroads traverse property
- Fronts Highway 50
- Bordered by the Brazos River on the west and the Little Brazos River on the east
- Mineral conveyance is negotiable
- Astin, Texas is about 20 minutes from Bryan/College Station, with development potential


















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
